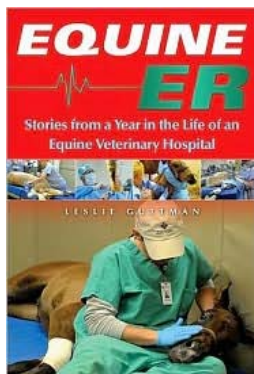

Volunteers - Care and Feeding

How many times have you witnessed a volunteer face the wrath of an angry competitor? It happens and it happens a lot. Have you ever seen some poor soul sitting for hours frantically inputting scores? Did you ever think to bring them a cup of coffee? When a volunteer agrees to work at painting fences with their club, has anyone who benefits from this effort say "thanks"? Pretty often, volunteers are seen as faceless, nameless people in the background. In order to keep this volunteer there are a few things that can be easily done by club members and competitors.

Say "thank you" and mean it. It is amazing how this small acknowledgement from a competitor or club makes all the difference. You could nominate this volunteer for the HCBC Volunteer Award.

Please don't blame the volunteer if you are having a bad day. Maybe the volunteer is having a bad day too. Also remember that the volunteer did not personally create the footing in the warm up ring, and complaining to them will not magically change it. If you don't like the footing, let the show management know, but don't berate the ring clerk or the entry secretary.

A cup of coffee, a smile and some conversation go a long way; try offering this to the volunteer cleanup crew at the next trail or club work bee. Feed the volunteers! Give them hot drinks when it is cold and cold drinks when it is hot.

Clubs do not speak negatively about your volunteers to anyone, ever. Competitions, recognize that your volunteers are just that and don't treat them like second class employees. Cherish, covet, and coddle, your volunteers. On the flip side of the coin, volunteers please don't let people down. If you are unable to do the job you have volunteered for, let an organizer know in advance if possible.

Finally the secret to keeping volunteers is simple. Say these magic words, "Thank you! I appreciate what you are doing."

To continue the conventions goal of topics for everyone, Paton and Martin Veterinary Services will present "What your Vet wants you to know", and Isabelle Aube will speak about athletic conditioning and rehab for riders. Rounding up our excellent slate of speakers is Jennifer Wood who will deliver a Horse Hauling course with information that anyone who trailers a horse needs to know.

New CFIA Fines

The Government of Canada is cracking down on those who mistreat and improperly transport livestock by more than doubling current fines - the first increase in over 10 years. Effective immediately, administrative monetary penalties (AMPs) of up to \$10,000 can be imposed, more than doubling the previous maximum penalty of \$4,000, on those who violate the Health of Animals Act.

"The agriculture industry knows that a healthy farm and processing business begins with healthy animals and while the majority handles and transports animals safely, a few need to do better," said Agriculture Minister Gerry Ritz. "Our Government is providing the Canadian Food Inspection Agency with the tools it needs to impose tougher fines and improve animal welfare."

The CFIA will now be able to impose fines up to a maximum of \$10,000 instead of \$4,000. The CFIA will retain the ability to increase fines by up to 50% of the maximum fine for repeat offenders. The CFIA will now also have the ability to look back into the past five years, instead of three years, of the offender's history. For example, if an offender commits his second very serious violation within five years, the CFIA will now have the ability to impose a fine of up to \$15,000, instead of the previous maximum of \$6,000.

The AMPs system was developed as an efficient, effective enforcement tool. AMPs may be issued for violations of the Health of Animals Act, which includes requirements for animal welfare during transport. These increases will also be applied to the Plant Protection Act to deal with violations such as the importation of prohibited plants.

In addition to these improved AMPs, the CFIA continues to work with animal welfare experts and industry leaders to update the Health of Animals Regulations governing livestock transportation to reflect the latest science and industry practices.

Equine Education Conference

Escape the winter weather! Join other like minded equine enthusiasts at HCBC's *"Equine Education Conference"* running January 22 & 23, 2011 in Kelowna, BC. Enjoy two days of socializing, networking and learning at a **FIVE** star resort!

Our exceptional speaker line up includes:

Dr. Hilary Clayton who will speak on the Biomechanics of the Equine Gait. A gifted veterinarian and researcher, Dr. Clayton will teach you how your horse moves, conditioning programs and how to deal with lameness.

Judy Wardope will teach you how to *"Improve Your Eye for Functional Conformation"*. Judy will demonstrate the connection between how a horses' conformation affects its ability to perform. You will also learn techniques to evaluate your horse's conformation and how to make good performance and training decisions.

Jennifer Woods is a Livestock Handling Specialist with a degree in Animal Science. Her *"No Stress Horse Hauling"* presentation will cover off how to make educated choices when purchasing a trailer, equipment maintenance, accident response and horse behaviour and handling.

Paton & Martin Veterinary Services will teach you *"What Your Vet Wants You to Know."* Also covered will be the latest information on deworming, wound management and lameness.

Mike King of CAPRI Insurance comes with a wealth of knowledge in the insurance industry, specializing in *"Equine Insurance Coverage"*. Mike will explain in detail the in's and out's of insurance and the importance of proper coverage.

Equine Canada Bans Clenbuterol

As of **January 1, 2011**, Clenbuterol (Ventipulmin) will no longer be a permitted medication in Equine Canada sanctioned competitions. As a result, horses competing in Equine Canada sanctioned competitions with a positive test result for Clenbuterol will be sanctioned as per the Equine Canada penalty tables and drug classification system as a Class III offence. A withdrawal time of at least 72 hours is recommended after the last administration of this product. For additional information, please see the Canadian Pari-Mutuel Agency Schedule of Drugs.

Province Launches Review of Animal Health Policy

British Columbians are invited to participate in a review of the province's animal health policy and legislation during a 60-day web-based consultation, announced Agriculture Minister Ben Stewart today. The deadline to provide feedback is January 23, 2011.

"We're seeking the public's view on animal health issues and asking for input from those whose work is affected by animal health issues," said Stewart. "Animal health is important to all British Columbians. It's not only an important issue for farmers, ranchers, and food processors, but it can also impact human health when diseases are passed from animals to people."

Animal health management generally involves two broad sets of activities: disease prevention and outbreak management and control. Managing animal health is important for the ongoing success of animal farming and

ranching in B.C. The agriculture industry, veterinarians, and others all play important front-line roles in animal health management. The province has an important role in supporting successful animal disease prevention by having the authority to quickly act to control disease outbreaks.

"It's essential that B.C.'s animal health management system is responsive and that it safeguards both animal and human health, and the economic well-being of farmers and ranchers," said Stewart. "I'm really encouraging members of the general public and anyone with an interest in animal health to take part in this review."

The Ministry of Agriculture is reviewing the existing animal health legislation and policy, focussing primarily on the Animal Disease Control Act and related legislation, regulation, and policy. The Animal Disease Control Act is B.C.'s central animal health statute, and is over 50 years old. The goal of the review is to develop a robust framework for the management of animal health in British Columbia.

Canada Takes Home 2nd Place in Buenos Aires Nations Cup

The Canadian Show Jumping Team comprised of Samantha Buirs of Langley, BC along with Lisa Carlsen, Angela Covert-Lawrence and Lauren Hunkin finished second in the Nations' Cup competition held Friday, November 12, at CSIO4*-W Buenos Aires, Argentina.

This was Samantha's debut on Canada's Show Jumping Team along with fellow team mates Angela Covert-Lawrence and Lauren Hunkin.

Out of six teams representing five countries, Canada finished the two-round competition with a total of 37 faults taking home second place.

Buirs and Total Touch, her 10-year-old Dutch Warmblood mare, had 18 faults in the first round. As only three riders per nation come back for the second round, Buirs did not return.

"I was very happy with our second place result in the Nations' Cup today in Buenos Aires," said Mark Laskin, chef d'équipe of the Canadian Show Jumping Team. "I was proud of our first time team members they stepped up to the challenge of their international debuts. The enthusiasm and



camaraderie of this team was instrumental to their great ride today. They represented Canada in fine fashion."

The United States won the Nations' Cup with a two-round total of 24 faults with Canada as the runner-up with 37 faults.

The four Canadian riders will continue competing at CSIO4*-W Buenos Aires through to Sunday, when they contest the Grand Prix, which acts as a World Cup qualifying event.
